Kwait is sworn in as new Yavapai-Apache Nation Chairman

Newly elected Yavapai-Apache Nation Chairman David Kwait was sworn in to office Thursday, October 7, in front of a packed audience which included former Chairmen Thomas Beauty, Jamie Fullmer and Vincent Randall.

Kwait beat out challenger Roberta Pavatea during the September 18, General Election by 23 votes, one of the closest races in the Nation's history.

Pavatea attempted to halt the swearing in by filing an Injunction to Stay the Swearing In and a Motion for Time to Contest Election Results on September 28, but her requests were denied by the court allowing the swearing in to move forward without disruption.

Also sworn in were, Vice Chairman Robert Jackson Sr., Councilwoman Tanya Lewis-Moore, and Councilman Dave Kinsey Jr.

Each of the council members will serve a three year term ending in 2013.

National Adoption Month

In honor of National Adoption Month the Nation's Department of Social Services encourages Yavapai-Apache Nation families to apply to become foster/adoptive homes for YAN children in need.

The Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) enacted in 1978 was designed to "protect the best interests of Indian children and to promote the stability and security of Indian tribes and families."

The law required that Indian children placed for adoption would be placed first with members of the child's extended family, then with other member's of the child's tribe and lastly with other Indian families.

Each year the Nation's Department of Social Services places approximately 20 children in foster/adoptive homes.

While the Nation's adoption rate is low, the need to place children in foster care remains constant.

The department follows tribal preference placement when placing children in foster care; first attempting to place a child with relatives, then other YAN families, other Indian families and lastly with non-Indian families.

With a lack of qualified foster homes in the Nation, the Department of Social Services is in dire need of Native foster/adoptive homes for children in need of placement.

Requirements for becoming a foster/adoptive home are:

- Application
- Criminal background of all household members 18 years and older
- Physical exam (foster/adoptive parents)
- References (requires three)
- Identification
- Immunization record of all children in the home (foster/adoptive parent's children)
- Parenting classes
- Home study (includes a walk through of the home)
- License (DSS Certification)

Lightning strikes Tribal Gaming Office during storm

October 6 was an electrifying day for the Tribal Gaming Office, as it was struck by lightning that morning.

The lightning strike caused

extensive damage to the building including knocking out the phone system, computers and electronic equipment, effectively shutting down TGO operations for more than a week.

The Nation's MIS Department has been working with various contractors to restore service to the building, but TGO operations remain limited.

According to Carol Carrillo, TGO Executive Director, phone service is limited, computer access is non-existent and electronic equipment, including the badge making system is still down.

Carrillo says that TGO

has been able to work with the Nation's Enrollment Department to issue temporary badges to new hires and existing employees who require replacements.

"Hopefully, by the end of

the month we'll be back in service," says Carrillo.

The lightning was a result of severe storms that moved through Arizona October 6, spawning tornadoes near the Flagstaff area.

Prohibits laws or rules that require participation in any health care system; allows a person, employer or health care provider to forgo health insurance and pay or receive payment for health care directly without a penalty; specifically allows the purchase and sale of health insurance in private health care systems.

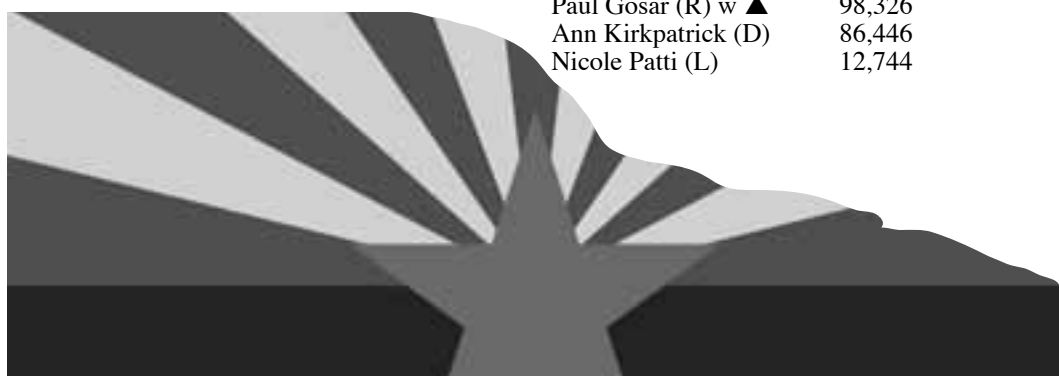

Arizona Office of Tourism offers tips on how to draw visitors to the Nation

The Nation's Economic Development Administration and Office of Public Relations attended the Arizona Office of Tourism's Native Outreach Conference October 19 at the Cliff Castle Casino Hotel as part of a joint effort to learn more about the tourism industry in Arizona and the opportunities available to the Nation.

Vice Chairman Robert Jackson Sr. welcomed the attendees saying, "The Nation's hotel and casino would not be here if it weren't for the tourists. We depend on the tourists to help sustain our economy."

AOT offered advice on everything from community outreach to developing watchable wildlife programs.

"With the economy lagging, we have to look for alternative sources of revenue for the Nation and capturing tour-

being broken up into pieces and with limited resources available to us, we have to come up with innovative ways to interest tourists to visit the Nation

We want to build on the

tourism industry, but we don't want to commercialize or jeopardize our culture in any manner," Chavez goes on to say.

Cliff Castle Casino Hotel in coordination with AOT cur-

rently hosts familiarization tours, otherwise known as FAM tours, as a way to build interest in the Nation.

FAM tours are intended to educate and familiarize tour operators and media organizations about the Nation and the experiences available to them when visiting the Verde Valley.

Randy Puett, Cliff Castle Casino Hotel Sales Manager says that two AOT FAM tours are currently scheduled and include one group of international press representatives.

The Nation's departments and Cliff Castle Casino Hotel will continue to work with AOT to promote the Nation as a tourist destination.

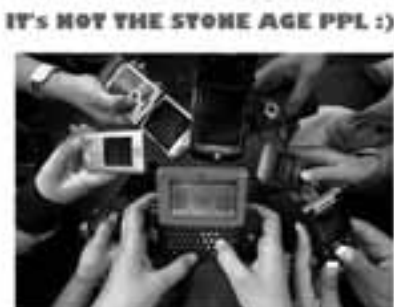

Nation lays groundwork for natural gas service at casino corridor

Natural gas service at the casino corridor is getting one step closer to becoming a reality.

Frontline Energy Services out of Flagstaff has been contracted by the Nation to complete gas line boring underneath the four lanes of I-17. The Nation hopes to eventually connect to existing gas lines located 1.5 miles north of the Middle Verde Reservation.

A connection will allow the Nation to supply natural gas to the casino corridor and possibly to Middle Verde residents and other businesses in the area.

Work on the project was partially completed when one of the lines being pulled became unhooked from the

tether used to pull the line underneath I-17.

Both the Nation and Frontline took remedial action to correct the problem and work is expected to resume within the next couple of weeks.

The boring project was jump started when former Chairman Jamie Fullmer negotiated with ADOT to obtain a right-of-way permit to bore underneath I-17. Chairman Fullmer with the aide of former Arizona Governor Janet Napolitano obtained the permit from the Federal Interstate Department out of Washington, D.C. in 2007.

Vice Chairman Robert Jackson Sr. and Councilwoman Linda Evans have since taken the lead on the construction and development of the casino corridor, including the boring project.

Enjoy a healthy Thanksgiving

This year, be thankful for Thanksgiving, not thankful that Thanksgiving will be over soon. By preparing ahead and making simple changes to your routine you can enjoy a healthier Thanksgiving without the hassle of feeling like you're the turkey running around with its head cut off.

Here are some easy tips to help you enjoy a healthier, relaxing holiday.

1. Make desserts the day before. Your oven is already reserved for the roasting the turkey on Thanksgiving day, so why not make your pies and cakes the day before and not have to worry about juggling items to and from the oven.

2. Buy desserts from a bakery. Even better, why not buy pre-made pies and cakes from the bakery.

3. Cut and dice vegetables the day before. Pre-cutting and pre-slicing vegetables is an easy way to save yourself a lot of work on Thanksgiving day. Peel your potatoes the day before, soak them in water and place in the refrigerator overnight to prevent oxidation. What could be better than homemade mashed potatoes?

4. Thaw your turkey



properly. Nothing is worse than trying to work with a bird who won't flap his wings. By properly thawing your turkey you can prevent frostbitten fingers.

Refrigerator thawing times:
4 to 12 pounds 1 to 3 days
12 to 16 pounds 3 to 4 days
16 to 20 pounds 4 to 5 days
20 to 24 pounds 5 to 6 days

5. Don't go to dinner starving. When we're hungry, we eat more and faster. Eat a healthy breakfast and lunch before going to Thanksgiving dinner.

6. Eat your bird naked. Remove the skin from your turkey slice and cut out some of the fat and cholesterol from your plate.

7. Add color to your meal. Fill half your plate with vegetables and other healthy choices rather than starches.

8. Drink plenty of water. Nothing is better for you than

water. Water helps fill your stomach and prevents you from overindulging in breads, cakes and pies

9. Make substitutions.
Recipe calls for
Substitute

- 1 whole egg
- 2 egg whites
- sour cream
- low fat plain yogurt or low fat sour cream
- milk
- skim or 1% milk
- ice cream
- frozen yogurt
- heavy cream (not for whipping)
- 1:1 ratio of flour whisked into non fat milk
- whipped cream chilled
- evaporated skim milk or other low fat whipped products
- cheese low-fat cheese (note: non-fat cheese does not melt well if used for baking)
- butter light butter
- cream of mushroom
- fat-free cream of mushroom

10. Gather Family. Involve your family in the holiday preparations. Let the kids help peel and dice potatoes/vegetables (with supervision). Have the older children help with washing dishes and serving.

New Housing Construction Coming Soon

Yavapai Apache Nation Tribal Housing is pleased to announce the grant award received for their next Low Income Housing Tax Credit project for Limited Partnership #4.

This award will be used to construct 36 new housing units which will be located in the Tunlii Community.

Units will consist of (19) single family units, (4) Duplex units, and (3) Triplex units. One (1) unit will be dedicated for a tribal police officer to reside on site.

Construction is to begin January 2011.

Applicants who are income qualified will be selected from the Low Income Housing Tax Credit waiting list. Selection will be based on Elder preference, Set Asides based on grant application, and then by Date of application.

The Low Income Housing Tax Credit is a Federal pro-

gram overseen by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), Department of Justice (DOJ), and Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The inner agencies for the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program are Arizona Department of Housing (ADOH) and the Yavapai-Apache Nation Tribal Housing (YANTH).

A big thanks to the Yavapai Apache Nation Tribal Council (past & present), YANTH Staff, YAN Attorney General Staff and Travis Asset Management in their due diligence to acquire additional housing units for the Nations' tribal members.

Vivian Stevens successfully completes Cliff Castle Casino's three year Tribal Management Program

After completing a three year stint in Cliff Castle Casino's Tribal Management Program, tribal member Vivian Stevens was recently honored at a luncheon celebrating her graduation from the program.

The program was developed by Tribal Management Program Administrator Naomi Sorenson as a tool to provide tribal members the experience and education to obtain a management position at Cliff Castle Casino.

Over the three years she was enrolled in the program, Stevens worked in 19 departments, attended Yavapai College and the University of Reno, obtaining a Management and Gaming Certificate and an Associate of Applied Science in Management Degree.

Between 4:00 - 6:00 p.m. an open house focusing on ecological plan components will be held in each location. Following the open house, a workshop on the recreation plan components will begin with a presentation promptly at 6:00 pm. Individuals planning to attend the recreation workshop should arrive by 6:00 and plan to stay until 8:30 pm.

Much has changed since the current Forest Plan was approved in 1987, including public values and expectations from public lands; recreation demand and types of recreation uses; demographic and development patterns; and natural resource policy. Other changes have occurred on the landscape itself. Our knowledge about landscape processes, science, and technology has also changed. Even though amendments have been made to the Forest Plan, it no longer fully reflects the

current needs of the forest and neighboring communities. Public input early and often is vital to the forest planning process.

State Health Insurance Available to You

Why Apply For State Health Insurance?

Health Care through Phoenix Indian Medical Center is provided in two (2) ways:

1. DIRECT CARE
Direct Care includes all Health Services provided directly by Phoenix Indian Medical Center.

2. CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES

Some services such as hand services, cardiac testing, MRI's & Level 2 or higher Ultrasounds are not available at Phoenix Indian Medical Center. These type of services will require a referral to an outside private hospital or specialist.

This care, when authorized is paid for through the Contract Health Services Program. If you require care that is not available at Phoenix Indian medical Center, your doctor will make a referral to an outside private hospital or specialist. **THIS REFERRAL DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE PHOENIX INDIAN MEDICAL CENTER CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES PROGRAM WILL PAY FOR THE SERVICE(S) REQUESTED!** The Contract Health Service Program is the only program that can authorize payment for care received outside Phoenix

INSURANCE	DESCRIPTION OF INSURANCE
Medicaid	For adults and children with limited income.
Baby Arizona (S.O.B.R.A.)	For pregnant women.
KidsCare	For children under age 19 who are uninsured and have income higher than the Medicaid limit.
Health Insurance for Parents	For parents of some Medicaid or KidsCare eligible children who are uninsured and have limited income.
Arizona Long Term Care System (ALTCS)	For adults and children who need long term care services provided by a nursing home. Services may be provided in the person's own home.
Medicare Cost Sharing Program	For adults and children who have or could have Medicare. This program helps pay for Medicare premiums, co-payments and deductibles.
Freedom to Work	For working individuals 16 to 65 years of age who are either disabled or blind with Medicare.
SSDI-Temporary Medical Coverage	For Arizonans who receive social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), who are no longer eligible for AHCCCS (Medicaid) Programs, but are not yet eligible for Medicare. You must be willing to pay a monthly premium.

Indian Medical Center. Before Contract Health Service Program can authorize your refer-

ral, you will be **REQUIRED** to apply for the above program you are found potentially eli-

gible for.

Facts about Tribal Medical Assistance Program and CoPay Reimbursement Program

The Tribal Medical Assistance Program and the Co Pay Reimbursement Program is funded thru the Yavapai-Apache Nation for Medical, Dental and Vision services.

Vision: Provides eyewear on an annual basis to Tribal Members of the Yavapai-Apache Nation who do not have vision insurance for the full amount of \$150; Tribal Members who are insured are allowed \$75. Eye exam and Contacts are not covered.

Children who are on Medicaid (AHCCCS) program are not eligible for Tribal Vision Assistance; they must utilize their AHCCCS plan, how-

ever the program will pay \$25 for the Polycarbonate that AHCCCS does not cover. In some cases there may be an exception; this will be evaluated on a case by case basis.

Dental: The dental program provides emergency dental which includes major dental up to 50 % based on the type of service which includes root canal and crowns and other limited services. It does not pay for implants, veneers or cosmetic dentistry. The program does not pay for regular dental visits or exams or dental hygiene.

Medical: The medical assistance program assists only

with emergent needs such as RX prescriptions if there is no insurance coverage thru Private insurance or AHCCCS. You must enroll with an alternate resource that's available thru Medicaid. In some cases medical bills may be paid after a research has been done as to why AHCCCS, I.H.S. or insurance did not pay. Medical assistance does not pay for cosmetic surgery or abortions.

Medical bills must be current and as soon as you received them please bring them in. This is only a one time payment made during the year at 40%.

Co Pay Reimbursement:

This is only for the Yavapai-Apache Nation tribal members living in the CHSDA area, (Contract Health Service Delivery Area) Live on or near your own reservation in the Yavapai County. The Reimbursement program will reimburse your co pays for doctor visits, RX prescriptions and Medicare D co pays. The program does not pay for AHCCCS co pays. (I.H.S. does not reimburse AHCCCS co pays.)

When submitting your receipt please bring the "Super Bill" or E.O.B. (explanation of benefits) from your doctor visit. The E.O.B comes in the

mail from your insurance company. As for the RX prescription, turn in your receipt and the "customer receipt" this has your name, address, name of prescription, RX number and amount of co pay. If you do not turn in the E.O.B. or a super bill from your doctor visit or "customer receipt" from the pharmacy you will not be reimbursed until all items are turned in.

When you request for assistance you will need to fill out an application at the Yavapai-Apache Health Center office, by mail or downloading the form at Yavapai-Apache.org. The phone number to contact

Please call the Yavapai-Apache Health Center when you go to the Emergency Room or Urgent Care within 72 hours. It is your responsibility to notify YAHC (Yavapai-Apache Health Center) of outside doctor visits and if the doctor refers you out. Please leave a message if we are not available, with your name and phone number, name of doctor, hospital, phone number and diagnosis. Please call 928-567-2168, 928-567-8461 or 928-567-8470. Thank you

Greetings from the Yavapai-Apache Health Center!

The primary focus, at the health center, is to provide outpatient health services to the community. This allows people to receive health care in their own community and maintain good health. The medical clinic services include care of chronic disease, health promotion and disease prevention, and well exams. All services are available through ap-

pointment. Other services include Dental, Dental Hygiene, Optometry, Nutrition, Audiology and Behavioral Health.

Chronic conditions include diabetes mellitus, high blood pressure, arthritis and other medical conditions. These conditions require routine labs and testing- every 3 months, and daily medications. Preventative health care includes

women's health exams, well baby/child check ups, immunizations and physicals. We provide counseling and birth control options, and do screening tests for diabetes mellitus and other conditions. We currently have all immunizations required by the schools, including Varicella or Chicken Pox vaccine.

We have a limited number

of slots reserved for urgent appointments. These are made available that day for people who need to be seen the same day. Please call in the morning to receive a same day appointment.

Unfortunately, we do not have emergency services

Contract Health Service

This is a brief description of Contract Health Service (CHS) thru the Phoenix Indian Medical Center (PIMC).

Direct Care Eligibility

- Patients who are Native American from a federally recognized Tribe can receive care directly at any IHS and Tribal Health programs (hospitals and clinics). Only med-

ical services available on site.

- Eligibility is established by documented proof of Indian Decent from a Tribe or the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

What is Contract health Services?

- Other funding allocated by Congress to use specifically for patient care not covered by other programs.

- CHS is for Native American members of federally recognized tribe who reside on or near the reservation established for the local tribe(s) in geographic areas called contract health service delivery areas (CHSDAs).
- The eligibility require-

The Yavapai-Apache Health Center (YAHC) makes courtesy calls the day before a client's scheduled appointment. Therefore, it is important to update your phone numbers with YAHC as soon as there are changes.

Diabetic supplies include Accu-Chek test strips, alcohol pads, lancets, and syringes. PIMC toll-free number is 1-877-733-7462, ask the operator to transfer you to the Pharmacy Refill Line. Please have your PIMC chart number and medication (Rx) number available, when calling. Each

time you receive your medications from PIMC you will receive a blue sheet, which lists all medications with the Rx numbers and how many refills you have left. Keep this blue sheet handy, in case you may need refills on other medications and supplies.

Reminder: after ordering on the PIMC Refill Line, inform the Yavapai-Apache Health Center to assure that your medication will be sent to Camp Verde. Our phone number is 928-567-2168.

Search for missing girl in Coconino County

Referrals/AHCCCS/Alternate Resource

When the Doctor puts a referral in for a patient and the patient has no insurance coverage you will be responsible to apply for an alternate resource such as AHCCCS. AHCCCS applications are available at the Yavapai-Apache Health Center or we can assist you with the application by completing a One-E App online. If you have an AHCCCS plan other than American Indian Health Plan you will need to go thru your primary care pro-

vider thru AHCCCS to get referred out or if you plan on getting your health care services thru Yavapai-Apache Health Center we can change you AHCCCS plan over to American Indian Health Plan.

If you have private insurance the referral will go thru Contract Health Service for a decision, Contract Health Service will send you a letter to apply for AHCCCS because there is a possibility you may qualify if you fail to follow

CHS guidelines your referral or emergency room visit may get denied. If you do not qualify for AHCCCS you will still need to provide an AHCCCS denial letter for Contract Health Service.

Anyone from the ages 65-67 you may be receiving information from Medicare due to open enrollment coming up. If you receive information on Medicare and do not understand the material, please bring your information

to the Yavapai-Apache Health Center and we can assist you. Also anyone who does Not have Medicare Part D you will be able to sign up in November 2010. Keep this in mind that any Alternative Resource Available can be beneficial to you.

10 Guidelines for Effective Discipline of Children

1. The goal of discipline is to teach children acceptable behavior. Whenever possible, teach children what you want to see rather than punishing them.
2. View children's misbehavior as a mistake in judgment. It will be easier to think of ways to teach more acceptable behavior.
3. Never hit or shake infants. They do not know right and wrong. They do not mis-

behave on purpose. They need love and protection, not punishment

4. Create a safe environment for children by baby-proofing your house. Distract or remove infants and toddlers when they are doing something they shouldn't be doing.
5. Provide order and consistency. Whenever possible have regular times for meals, studying and bedtime.

6. Give toddlers and preschoolers age-appropriate choices and consequences
7. Establish family rules that are appropriate for children's ages. Keep them few in number with clear and reasonable consequences for not obeying.
8. Develop a trusting relationship with children by protecting them from harm, by being honest trustworthy, and by

exhibiting predictable and mature behavior.

9. Children need to hear more good things about themselves than bad things. Offer praise for appropriate behavior. Praise will increase that behavior.
10. Adopt a "no-hitting" attitude. No one has a right to hit anyone else in the household... that includes hitting children for misbehavior.

Parkinson's support group: Nutrition's impact on the disease process

Verde Valley Medical Center (VVMC) is hosting a free Parkinson's disease support group from 4 - 5:30 p.m., Friday, Nov. 12 in Conference Room C. The meeting is open to patients, family members, caregivers and anyone interested in learning about Parkinson's disease.

This meeting, "Nutrition and Its Impact on the Disease Process," is presented by nutri-

tionist Elaine Fox, Ph.D. Fox has more than 30 years experience in nutrition and has been practicing in the Verde Valley for 20 years.

Parkinson's disease belongs to a group of conditions called movement disorders. It is both chronic and progressive, meaning its symptoms grow worse and continue over time. Some common symptoms of Parkinson's are tremors of the

hands, arms, legs or jaw; rigidity or stiffness of the limbs and trunk; slowness of movement; and postural instability or impaired balance and coordination.

As many as 1 million Americans suffer from Parkinson's disease, and 40,000 new cases are diagnosed each year. On average, the onset age for Parkinson's disease is 60 years old; however, an estimated 15

percent of Parkinson's disease patients are diagnosed before the age 50.

ments are strict for CHS care than for direct services.

- Not all Native American are eligible for CHS funds.
- Non-Indians are ineligible for any CHS funding, unless Non-Indian is pregnant with eligible Indian child.
- CHS process self-referrals (ER visits), patient transfers from PIMC & non-emergent referrals.
- Eligibility is determined by federal regulation (eligibility criteria).
- There are six (6) eligibility criteria. Patients must meet all six (6) criteria for each episode of care to be eligible for CHS funding.

CHS six (6) Eligibility Criteria

1. Enrolled member and Indian Descent
 - The patient must be a member of the Tribe or Tribes served by the local Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA). (42 CFR 136.23)
2. Residency
 - The patient must live in his/her IHS or 638 facilities Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA). If the patient is living out of the area for more than 180 days, he or she is no longer eligible for

available at the clinic. There is no x-ray, CT or lab available. If people need emergency services; chest pain, trouble breathing, an accident, or injury, then the best course of action is to **Call 911**.

Exercise is important for good health, at least 30 minutes every day, for kids, at least 1 hour a day of physical activity for adults.

- CHS is the payer of last resort by federal regulation.

The regulations states: The IHS "will not be responsible for or authorize payment for Contract Health Services to the extent that the Indian is eligible for alternate resources...or the Indian would be eligible for alternate resources were they apply for them." (42
